The fifth symposium in the *Historical Judgment* series, which will take place on **Friday, 23 June 2023**, will explore colonial and anti-colonial thinking in German history. What positions did Kant, Herder, and Hegel take on colonialism? What criticism was levelled at the German colonies in the colonial period? What critical engagement was there with colonialism under National Socialism? And what were the differences between anti-colonialism in East and West Germany before 1989?

These and other questions will be discussed by historians, philosophers, political scientists, and sociologists at the international interdisciplinary symposium "Colonial and Anti-Colonial Thinking from the Enlightenment to the 20th Century". We hope that this exchange of ideas will provide stimulating perspectives on the complex, ambivalent relationship between colonialism and anti-colonialism in German history and lead to a better understanding of contemporary debates about the colonial past."

The symposium will be accompanied by the fifth issue of the magazine Historical Judgment, titled "Colonial and Anti-Colonial Thinking from the Enlightenment to the 20th Century" and scheduled for publication on 13 July 1923.
